Call to Order:

Chairman Keith Weakley called to order the regular meeting of the Page County Board of Supervisors on Monday, July 17, 2023, at 7:00 p.m., in the Board of Supervisors Room located in the Page County Government Center, 103 South Court Street, Luray, VA. The Call to Order was followed by an Invocation given by Supervisor Allen Louderback, and the *Pledge of Allegiance*.

Adoption of Agenda:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved that the Page County Board of Supervisors adopt the agenda as presented. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Weakley, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

Public Hearings

Review of Zoning Ordinance Amendment – Self-storage Facilities: Exhibit A
The public hearing on the zoning ordinance amendment was advertised as follows:

Amend Section 125-30.19 A-E (*Self-storage facilities*) of the Page County Zoning Ordinance.

The full text of the proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance may be reviewed in the Planning & Community Development Office, 103 South Court Street, Suite B, Luray, VA, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. They may also be reviewed on the County's website at www.pagecounty.virginia.gov. NOTE: Hearing impaired individuals who need an interpreter must notify the Zoning Office at least seven (7) days prior to the hearing.

Chairman Weakley opened the public hearing on the Zoning Ordinance Amendment, Section 125-30.19 A-E (Self-storage facilities) at 7:01 p.m.

Tracy Clatterbuck, Zoning Administrator, noted that the proposed amendment is to reword Section 125-30.19 D (Self-storage facilities) to only apply to the Agriculture zoning district. The fencing requirement will be considered when an application is submitted for a special use permit (SUP). The proposed amendment is as follows:

- D. ~~The self-storage facility, including loading areas and all storage areas, shall be totally enclosed by structures or by an eight-foot high opaque wall or fence. Such fences shall be set back at least six feet from property boundaries. Landscaping shall be provided in such setback areas, including trees and shrubs.~~ **In the Agriculture zoning district, fencing, screening, and security may be required for all facilities. Additional conditions may also be required as part of the special use permit review process.**

Public Comments on the Public Hearing:

There were no speakers during the public hearing.

Amend Section 125-30.3.G(2)(a) (*Wireless communication facilities*) of the Page County Zoning Ordinance to read as follows:

Tower structures shall be set back from the property line a distance equal to the height of the tower. The setback may be reduced to 1/10 the height of the tower if the applicant submits a report stamped by a professional engineer registered in the State of Virginia that certifies that the tower is designed to collapse upon failure within the distance from the tower to the property line and the reduced setback is approved by the Board of Supervisors.

The full text of the proposed amendment to the zoning ordinance may be reviewed in the Planning & Community Development Office, 103 South Court Street, Suite B, Luray, VA, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. They may also be reviewed on the County's website at www.pagecounty.virginia.gov. Chairman Weakley opened the public hearing on the proposed Zoning Ordinance amendment of Section 125-30.3 G(2)(a) at 7:04 p.m.

Tracy Clatterbuck, Zoning Administrator, noted that the proposed amendment will allow waiver requests for wireless communications facilities to be approved by the Board of Supervisors rather than the Planning Commission.

Public Comments on the Public Hearing:

There were no speakers during the public hearing.

Chairman Weakley closed the public hearing at 7:05 p.m.

Chairman Weakley opened the public hearing on the Budget Amendment at 7:05 p.m.

Mr. Olsen, Director of Finance, presented the Budget Amendment for the fiscal year 2024 budget as follows:

New requests

The Battle Creek Landfill has received \$1,000 from Keep Virginia Beautiful's Green Grant. It is requested that these local funds are appropriated for litter prevention.

The Chamber of Commerce has requested an additional appropriation of the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) revenue in the amount of \$37,878. Including the amount previously approved during the budget adoption process, their total allocation will be \$138,692, if approved. These funds will be used for a portion of their employees' wages, postage, rent, utilities, supplies, janitorial services, dues, education, and insurance. The Tourism Council recommended this appropriation be approved.

Economic Development and Tourism received two state marketing grants from the Virginia Tourism Corporation. These two grants total \$40,000 and require a total local match of \$46,370, which will be paid with TOT revenue. It is requested that these state funds and local TOT revenue are appropriated for these marketing initiatives.

School Board Requests

The General Assembly's deliberation on the state budget amendment has stalled; therefore, the School Board is moving forward with its request based on the adopted biennial state budget. The School Board requests \$623,353 for a five percent pay raise, \$77,635 for an early childhood special education teacher, and \$31,986 for the teacher's aide.

School Board Transfers and Carryovers

Since there were uncertainties with the General Assembly during the budget adoption process, the adopted budget for the School Operating Fund reused figures from the adopted budget for FY 2023. To update the budget for FY 2024, the School Board is requesting to transfer the following from the Instructional category:

- \$220,000 to the Transportation category,
- \$475,000 to the Operations & Maintenance category, and
- \$40,000 to the Technology category.

The School Board also requests a carryover of \$1,805,817 of state funds and \$693,076 of federal funds to the School Capital Projects Fund for various capital improvement projects, including HVAC upgrades.

Repeat Requests

During the budget adoption process, the Page County Sheriff's Office requested \$115,000 from the General Fund balance for a body scanner. The Board decided to reconsider the request once the School Board finalized its requests. The Sheriff's Office is again requesting \$115,000 for the body scanner. If the body scanner is not approved, the Sheriff's Office requests \$58,742 from the General Fund balance for an HVAC upgrade on the second floor of the patrol building (\$6,000) and cameras for the jail (\$52,742).

Carryover Requests

Economic Development and Tourism requests that the \$300,000 appropriated in FY 2023 from the General Fund balance for the meat processing facility project is carried over into FY 2024.

During the FY 2024 budget adoption process, the remaining ARPA funds designated for the VATI broadband project were unknown, so nothing was appropriated. The two ARPA programs, SLFRF and LATCF, have a remaining balance of \$483,678. It is requested that these federal funds are appropriated for the broadband project.

The remaining part of the broadband project's cost will be funded with the General Fund balance. It is requested that \$3,416,323 is appropriated for this project.

In FY 2021, the county paid over \$85,000 for Lumen's support coverage related to the NG911 program. Since the support services span from FY 2021 to FY 2026, a portion of these funds were considered prepaid for financial reporting purposes. Even though the bill was paid in FY 2021, only \$17,146 is expensed annually. Consequently, it is requested that \$17,146 of the Capital Projects Fund Balance be appropriated for this year's portion of this expense.

It is requested that \$1,300,441 of the County Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) Fund balance be appropriated for expenses related to our new radio system. These funds are the remaining unspent debt proceeds.

It is requested that \$976,909 of the Landfill Construction Fund balance is appropriated for expenses related to the Battle Creek Landfill Cell 11 construction. These funds are the remaining unspent debt proceeds and interest earned. Interest earned on this debt has exceeded \$130,000.

Public Comments on the Public Hearing:

Dr. Antonia Fox, Superintendent, Page County Public Schools (PCPS), clarified that the state budget that has been approved is the skinny budget and it was the one approved at the end of the General Assembly session, with anticipation that they would reconvene another session. Unfortunately, they have not reconvened, so the budget the school system moved forward with, in terms of the local allocation, is based on the FY2023 allocation to the division.

Regarding the question on the amount of money spent on the HVAC systems, she said the projects had to go out to bid and that is their policy. She also offered to provide the Board with any reports they would like to review.

She clarified that the federal funding cannot be used for salaries because, at the end of the grant, they would have to find local funds to maintain those positions. She said that the skinny budget funds that have been allocated for the 5% raise from the state is not going to change. The funds are awaiting acceptance by the school system, but that is based on the Board's decision tonight. She advocated that it is not good to return state money, especially given the current climate with funding, staffing, and hiring positions.

Supervisor Louderback asked Dr. Fox for a list of what has been spent on HVAC over the last three years and which schools have been upgraded as a result.

After discussion, Chairman Weakley closed the public hearing at 7:45 p.m.

Supervisor Guzy recommended that the Board look at each section of the proposed amendment individually.

New Requests:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the appropriation of \$85,248 from local funds and \$40,000 from state funds for the Battle Creek Landfill, the Chamber of Commerce, and Economic Development and Tourism as presented. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Stroupe, Foltz, Weakley, Guzy, Louderback. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

School Board Requests:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the appropriation of \$732,974 from the General Fund balance to increase the School Operating budget for the 5% pay raises and for the two positions (early childhood special education teacher, teacher’s aide), with the understanding that the school system will report back to the Board with any additional funding provided by the state. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz, Weakley. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

School Board Transfers and Carryovers:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the carryover appropriation of \$1,805,817 from state funds and \$693,076 from federal funds, as presented. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 4-1. Aye: Weakley, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe. Nay: Foltz. Absent: Vaughan.

Repeat Requests:

It is the consensus of the Board to postpone voting on the Sheriff’s Office request until the FY 2023 budget is closed and the Finance Director reviews the amount in the General Fund balance in preparation for the annual audit. The request was for the body scanner, HVAC upgrades, and jail cameras.

Carryover Requests:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the appropriation of \$483,678 from federal funds, \$3,716,323 from the General Fund, \$1,317,587 from the County CIP Fund, and \$976,909 from the Landfill Construction Fund, as presented. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Foltz, Weakley, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

Public Comments on Agenda Items:

Dennis Dovel spoke against the SUP application submitted by Jeffrey Dinges for a wedding venue. Mr. Dovel expressed concern for the safety of his grandchildren.

Matt Dovel spoke against the SUP application submitted by Jeffrey Dinges for a wedding venue. Mr. Dovel expressed concern for the safety of his children and the effect on the community.

Frankie Cabbage spoke against the SUP application submitted by Jeffrey Dinges for a wedding venue. Mr. Cabbage expressed concern about the location of the venue in relation to his property. He noted that he works swing shifts and was concerned about noise and vehicle disturbance. Mr. Cabbage also noted he had a petition signed by mostly local people and voiced his concern about the number of vehicles on the road.

Kim Rhinehart spoke against the SUP application and expressed concern about the location of the poultry house in relation to the location of the proposed wedding venue and the health of the poultry. Ms. Rhinehart also expressed concern about increased traffic on the road.

Phyllis Long spoke against the SUP application submitted by Jeffrey Dinges for a wedding venue. Ms. Long expressed concern about the maximum occupant load of 195 people, how long the permit is valid, the quality of life of her nephew and his neighbors, the damage to the road, and the volume of traffic on the road.

Jeff Dinges, applicant for a SUP for a wedding venue, handed out a packet to the Board members. Mr. Dinges noted that he was constructing a six-foot fence between his and Mr. Frankie Cabbage's property. He also explained that in 2022 there were only approximately six emergency calls from other wedding venues in Page County.

Special Entertainment Permit – Mt. Carmel Christian Academy Car and Truck Show:

Mrs. Nina Fox, Economic Development and Tourism Director, presented the special entertainment permit application for the Mt. Carmel Christian Academy Car and Truck Show for Board approval. The event is scheduled for September 16, 2023, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Mt. Carmel Christian Academy.

Motion: Supervisor Foltz moved to approve the Special Entertainment Permit for the Mt. Carmel Christian Academy event, Mt. Carmel Car and Truck Show, held on September 16, 2023, from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Supervisor Guzy seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 4-0, with 1 abstention. Aye: Louderback, Foltz, Weakley, Guzy. Nay: None. Abstain: Stroupe. Absent: Vaughan.

Special Entertainment Permit – VFW Comer-Jones Post 621 Pickin' At The Post Bluegrass Festival:

Mrs. Nina Fox, Economic Development and Tourism Director, presented the special entertainment permit application for the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Comer-Jones Post 621 Pickin' At The Post for Board approval. The event is scheduled for September 1-3, 2023, from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. daily at the VFW Comer-Jones Post 621.

Motion: Supervisor Foltz moved to approve the Special Entertainment Permit for the VFW Post 621 event, Pickin' at the Post, held September 1, September 2, and September 3, 2023, from 10:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Stroupe, Foltz, Weakley, Guzy, Louderback. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

Consent Agenda

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the Consent Agenda as follows:

Disposable Plastic Bag Tax Ordinance:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to table the proposed ordinance until all Board members can be present and participate in the discussion. Supervisor Foltz seconded

and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Weakley, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz. Nay: None. Absent: Vaughan.

New Business

Review of Special Use Permit – Jeffery Dinges:

Tracy Clatterbuck, Zoning Administrator, informed the Board that Jeffery S. Dinges filed an application for a special use permit (SUP) to operate a banquet/event facility located on Honeyville Road, Stanley, VA, and further identified by tax map number 79-(A)-76A. The parcel contains 5.719 acres and is zoned as Agriculture (A-1). The property is improved with an existing barn, an existing poultry house, and an existing litter shed building. The applicant is proposing to use the existing barn (approximately 55' x 50') that has been converted/remodeled to serve as the proposed banquet/event facility along with designated parking areas.

In August 2021, staff received a complaint that the applicants were renovating a barn that they were planning to use as a venue. Staff had a previous working relationship with Mr. Dinges from working on another SUP in 2021. Instead of automatically sending out a notice of violation, staff felt comfortable calling Mr. Dinges as a courtesy to ask him if he was renovating the structure to open a banquet/event facility. Mr. Dinges told staff that he was renovating the barn for his daughter's wedding. He was made aware that a SUP is required for banquet and event facilities. Based on that phone conversation, a notice of violation was not issued at that time. About a month later, staff received an email from the Health Department notifying the County that they had received an application for a sewage disposal permit for a wedding venue for the above listed property, and they inquired if the County was aware of this. In December 2021, the Dinges' submitted a SUP application for the venue. After six months of inactivity on the SUP application, the application was deemed incomplete by staff. In December 2022, staff received a complaint that Mr. Dinges opened their facility to host photography sessions for the holiday season. That is when the notice of violation was issued. Staff informed Mr. Dinges that they could not have any more events until they were approved to operate a banquet/event facility. In March 2023, staff received the second SUP application.

The comments from Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) include a note that the existing entrance to the poultry house on 79-(A)-76A and Maple Road may not be used as access to 79-(A)-76A for the proposed special use. VDOT has determined where the entrance can be, and the applicant is currently working with their engineering firm to submit the required documentation to VDOT.

The Health Department has no concerns with the application.

Ms. Clatterbuck noted that proximity to residences was the issue that garnered the most concern from neighboring property owners during the June 13, 2023, Planning Commission public hearing.

She requested the Board hold a public hearing for the special use permit at the August 21, 2023, regular meeting, and direct staff to provide adequate notice of such hearing in accordance with Section 15.2-2204 of the Code of Virginia.

Mr. David Reed, attorney for the applicant, invited the Board members to visit the property. Mr. Reed discussed mitigating factors that have been identified and are in the proposed SUP. He clarified that the poultry house is owned and operated by Mr. Dinges. Mr. Reed spoke to the concerns over the usage of the road. He noted that one of the application requirements is to contact the VDOT, and their recommendations are in the proposed SUP. He asked the Board to read the notes, read the proposed mitigating factors, come, and see the venue and talk to the applicant and everyone involved. Mr. Reed asked that a public hearing be scheduled for August 21, 2023.

Motion: Supervisor Louderback moved that the Page County Board of Supervisors hold a public hearing on the special use permit application for Jeffrey S. Dinges. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 3-2. Aye: Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz. Nay: Guzy, Weakley. Absent: Vaughan.

Open Public Comments:

There were no speakers during the open public comments.

Administrator's Report:

Amity Moler, County Administrator, noted that the next Board meeting is August 7, 2023. Supervisor Guzy informed the Board that he would be absent at the August 21, 2023, regular meeting.

Mrs. Moler explained that the Planning Commission is working through the amendments to the Zoning and Subdivision of Land ordinances, and they are having trouble because of the number on the commission. She informed the Board to expect a formal request to consider changing the membership of the commission back to ten members.

Mrs. Moler notified the Board that the request for proposal (RFP) for the stormwater project at the Battle Creek Landfill was issued. If anyone is interested, the details are on our website.

Page County has entered a submission to the Virginia Association of Counties (VACo) Achievement Award Program for our #WHYPageCounty videos. We should hear about our submission in August.

Mrs. Moler recommended that the Board visit Mr. Dinges' proposed wedding venue, if they have not already had a chance.

Supervisors Time:
