Proposed amendment to Section 125-67.D to read as follows:

Term and review of district. The district shall be in effect until November 1, 2030. A review of the district, including any additions to the district, may be made by the Board of Supervisors as provided by, and in accordance with, §§ 15.2-4309 through 15.2-4312 of the Code of Virginia 1950, as amended.

The full text of the proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance along with other materials may be reviewed in the Planning & Community Development Office, 103 South Court Street, Suite B, Luray, VA, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. It may also be reviewed on the County's website at www.pagecounty.virginia.gov. NOTE: Hearing impaired individuals who need an interpreter must notify the Zoning Office at least seven (7) days prior to the hearing.

Vice Chairman Foltz opened the public hearing on the Stonyman Agricultural/Forestal District at 7:01 p.m.

Ms. Tracy Clatterbuck, Zoning Administrator, explained to the Board that in 2000, a group of local farmers and landowners began the process of creating the first Agricultural and Forestal (Ag/F) District in Page County. This is a citizen-initiated program. In 2001, Page County adopted the Stonyman Ag/F District for a term of seven years. The district was last reviewed and adopted by the Board of Supervisors on July 19, 2016, which currently consists of approximately 2,045.23 acres. The district will expire on November 1, 2023.

An Ag/F District is, pursuant to § 15.2-4305 of the Code of Virginia, *“Each district shall have a core of no less than 200 acres in one parcel or in contiguous parcels. A parcel not part of the core may be included in the district (i) if the nearest boundary of the parcel is within one mile of the boundary of the core, (ii) if it is contiguous to a parcel in the district the nearest boundary of which is within one mile of the boundary of the core, or (iii) if the local governing body finds, in consultation with the advisory committee or planning commission, that the parcel not part of the core or within one mile of the boundary of the core contains agriculturally and forestally significant land...”*

The Board appointed members in accordance with state code guidelines, to serve on the Stonyman Ag/F District Committee.

In January 2023, notices and applications were sent to both landowners currently in the district, notifying them of the renewal process, and to landowners within a one-mile radius of the core of the district that were eligible to join. The new acreage for the district will consist of approximately 1883.5 acres.

The Stonyman Ag/F District Committee met several times to review and discuss the submitted applications and used criteria as set forth in the Code of Virginia to evaluate the applications.

As a result of those meetings, the Stonyman Ag/F District Committee determined the following proposed amendment to Chapter 125 (*Zoning Ordinance*), Section 125-67.B (*Division I – Stonyman Agricultural and Forestal District*) to read as follows:
Description of district. The advisory committee also recommended a change to the description of the Stonyman Ag/F District in Section 125-67.B of the Page County Zoning Ordinance.

Proposed amendment to Chapter 125 (*Zoning Ordinance*), Section 125-67.D (*Division I – Stonyman Agricultural and Forestal District*) to read as follows:

Term and review of district. The district shall be in effect until November 1, 2030. A review of the district, including any additions to the district, may be made by the Board of Supervisors as provided by, and in accordance with, §§ 15.2-4309 through 15.2-4312 of the Code of Virginia 1950, as amended.

The Page County Planning Commission held their public hearing on July 25, 2023. There were no objections from the public. The Planning Commission concurs with the Stonyman Ag/F District Committee and recommends approval.

Vice Chairman Foltz opened the public hearing on the Budget Amendment at 7:05 p.m.

Mr. Tyler Olsen, Finance Director, presented the proposed Budget Amendment for the fiscal year 2024 budget as follows:

At the September 5, 2023, work session, the Board approved a contract with A-Zone Environmental Services to make stormwater improvements at Battle Creek Landfill for \$696,405.03. A-Zone has since sent a letter saying that their bid price erroneously excluded labor expenses of \$34,000. If approved, a change order will be issued to increase the total price to \$730,405.03. It is requested that \$730,405 of the General Fund Balance is appropriated for this project.

In FY 2023, the Board approved the Economic Development and Tourism Department's appropriation request to contribute \$12,000 of the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) funds to the Page Valley Fair. Instead of contributing directly to the Fair, the Department agreed to pay for the Fair's website upgrades and digital content. \$10,000 was spent in FY 2023; however, \$2,000 of the work will be invoiced in FY 2024 as the work is completed. Consequently, it is requested that \$2,000 of the Tourism Fund Balance is appropriated for the Page Valley Fair.

During the Jollett Hollow incident, the Sheriff's Office received \$1,830 in local donations. It is requested that these funds are appropriated for emergency management supplies. The Sheriff's Office has received \$10,000 of state funds from the Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. It is requested that these funds are appropriated for the expenses listed in the attachment, such as computers for Investigations.

Public Comments on the Public Hearing

There were no speakers during the public hearing.

Vice Chairman Foltz closed the public hearing at 7:07 p.m.

Supervisor Louderback asked if there were any labor costs included in the bid from A-Zone Environmental Services, LLC. Mr. Olsen answered that subcontractors were included and that the additional \$34,000 was for the labor cost of A-Zone's employees. Mr. Louderback expressed concern that their employees were left out and recommended the Board split the difference due to the substantial oversight on the part of A-Zone. He noted that if the amount of the bid was closer to the other submissions, that could have given A-Zone an advantage in the Invitation For Bid (IFB) decision process. Supervisors Guzy and Vaughan agreed. Supervisor Vaughan asked what the

consequences are for denying this request. Mr. Guzy explained that if A-Zone does not accept the Board’s decision, then we would reissue the IFB. Mrs. Amity Moler, County Administrator, reminded the Board that the work must be completed by the end of 2023 in order to remain compliant with the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) regulations.

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve half of the \$34,000 modification request from A-Zone Environmental Services, LLC to include labor costs, totaling \$17,000. If A-Zone Environmental Services, LLC does not accept this accommodation, the Board directs staff to re-issue the Invitation for Bid for stormwater improvements at the Battle Creek Landfill. Supervisor Vaughan seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 4-1. Aye: Foltz, Vaughan, Guzy, Louderback. Nay: Stroupe. Absent: Weakley.

Motion: Supervisor Vaughan moved to approve the appropriation of revenue from local funds in the amount of \$1,830, from state funds in the amount of \$10,000, from the General Fund Balance in the amount of \$713,405, and from the Tourism Fund Balance in the amount of \$2,000 and expenditures to the General Fund in the amount of \$11,830, the Capital Projects Fund in the amount of \$713,405, and the Tourism Fund in the amount of \$2,000. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Foltz, Vaughan, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe. Nay: None. Absent: Weakley.

Public Comments on Agenda Items:

There were no Public Comments on Agenda Items.

Action Matters

Tax Relief for the Elderly:

Ms. Becky Smith, Commissioner of the Revenue, presented two proposed options for the Tax Relief for the Elderly and Disabled Program. Option one is raising the qualifying annual income level from \$21,500 to \$27,500. With this option, the approximate annual increase in relief granted is \$52,758. Option two is qualifying applicants using the median income for Page County based on U.S. census data. This option would allow for changes to the qualifications without the Board having to review annually. With this option, the approximate annual increase in relief granted is \$48,655. Ms. Smith also asked the Board to consider changing the annual deadline from April 1st to March 1st in order for her office to better process the applications and prepare for the first half tax billing cycle.

Motion: Supervisor Vaughan moved to table updating the Tax Relief for the Elderly and Disabled Program to allow all Board members to be present and participate in the discussion and vote. Supervisor Guzy seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Vaughan, Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz. Nay: None. Absent: Weakley.

Board & Commission Appointments:

Mrs. Regina Harner, Assistant County Administrator, reviewed the Board and Commission appointments as follows:

Luray-Page County Airport Authority:

Mr. Vaughan's term expired on August 20, 2023, and he would like to serve another term.

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to reappoint Mr. Jeff Vaughan to the Luray-Page County Airport Authority, term to begin August 21, 2023, and expiring August 20, 2027. Supervisor Stroupe seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 4-0, with one abstention. Aye: Guzy, Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz. Nay: None. Abstain: Vaughan. Absent: Weakley.

Resolution: Declaration of a Local Emergency:

Mr. Matt Cronin, Director of Emergency Services, presented the Board with a proposed resolution declaring a local state of emergency, declaring that Page County has activated the drought warning, and making a strong recommendation against open-air burning. Mr. Cronin explained that this proposed resolution differs from the Page County Disaster Relief Resolution approved in the August 9, 2023, work session in that there is a different reporting pathway. The previous resolution is a communication directly from the Board to the Governor's Office. This proposed resolution deals specifically with a local state of emergency and drought in the county in anticipation of requests for bulk water if wells run dry. Mr. Cronin discussed the timeline of this proposed resolution remaining in place as being from weeks to months. The decision to lift this declaration

will be based on information from the Virginia Drought Monitoring Task Force (DMTF). The DMTF looks at four indicators of drought: precipitation, groundwater levels, streamflow, and reservoir levels. Mr. Cronin stated that the earliest he would ask the Board to rescind this declaration is when the DMTF moves our groundwater levels from emergency to warning status.

Mr. Cronin noted that the DEQ is hosting a virtual meeting to address the ongoing drought conditions in the Shenandoah Valley region on September 25, 2023. He reiterated that this declaration will probably be in place for weeks to months, noting that even if it rains, we have over six months of shortage to account for.

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the Resolution: Declaration of a Local Emergency, Drought Warning, and Recommendation against Open-Air Burning, as presented. Supervisor Louderback seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Louderback, Stroupe, Foltz, Vaughan, Guzy. Nay: None. Absent: Weakley.

RESOLUTION DECLARATION OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY

Declaration of Local Emergency, Drought Warning, and Recommendation against Open-Air Burning

WHEREAS, the County Administrator serving as the Director of Emergency Management of Page County did hereby find:

1. Rainfall has been extremely low across Page County for the last six months;
2. Abnormally dry conditions exist across Page County;
3. The Virginia Department of Environmental Quality has declared a drought warning for Page County;
4. The severely dry conditions that currently exist are favorable for rapid fire spread which has the potential to impact life safety, cause peril to property, and create significant widespread fire hazard conditions; and

WHEREAS, it is strongly recommended that there is no open-air burning county-wide; and

WHEREAS, having met criteria for declaration of a local drought warning, pursuant to § 122-5 (Drought Management Ordinance) of the Page County Code, a drought warning is declared. Under a declared drought warning, restrictions on water usage are encouraged and requested;

WHEREAS, drought and atmospheric conditions will be continually monitored to justify the continuation of a local state of emergency and drought warning.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY PROCLAIMED that a state of local emergency exists throughout Page County, that a drought warning is declared, and open-air

burning is declared a hazard to the public safety and welfare to the citizens of Page County.

IT IS FURTHER HEREBY PROCLAIMED that restrictions on water usage by the citizens and businesses of Page County are declared to be in the public interest for the safety and welfare of the citizens of Page County.

IT IS FURTHER PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that during the existence of said emergency, the powers, functions, and duties of the Director of Emergency Management and the Emergency Management organization of Page County shall be those prescribed by State Law and the Ordinances, Resolutions, and approved plans of Page County in order to mitigate the effects of said emergency.

Consent Agenda:

Motion: Supervisor Guzy moved to approve the Consent Agenda as follows:

- Financial reports for the period of August 1-31, 2023;
- Accounts payable checks, payroll checks, payroll direct deposits, and payroll tax related electronic fund transfers totaling \$3,860,236.70 for the month of August 2023;
- Minutes of August 9, 2023 and August 28, 2023; and
- Two coyote claims totaling \$100.

Supervisor Vaughan seconded and the motion carried by a vote of 5-0. Aye: Stroupe, Foltz, Vaughan, Guzy, Louderback. Nay: None. Absent: Weakley.

Old Business:

Supervisor Guzy noted that the historical markers placed on U.S. 211 at the Shenandoah County line and on U.S. 340 at the Rockingham County line coming from the Town of Elkton are visible while driving and need restoration. Mr. Guzy explained that while driving, you cannot see the historical marker placed on the Rappahannock County line. Supervisor Vaughan asked if this cost qualifies to use the TOT funds. Mr. Guzy stated that if the cost does qualify, then the county should consider placing a historical marker at the Rappahannock County line where it is visible.

Supervisor Louderback requested the historical markers be updated to reflect Luray Caverns rather than Luray Cave.

New Business:

Supervisor Guzy asked if there was an update on the Culpepper inmates. Mrs. Moler noted that there were no updates.

Open Public Comments:

Angela Eppard wanted to discuss the proposed Special Use Permit (SUP) for Jeff Dinges for a wedding venue on Honeyville Road because she will not be available to attend any meetings in October. Her concern is that accurate statements are made. She

noted that when she worked on the barn, the music seemed louder from neighboring houses than when the wedding was held there.

Danielle Dinges spoke regarding the SUP for Jeff Dinges and handed out a packet to the Board. She wanted to address concerns brought up by the Board during the last meeting on August 28, 2023, related to the proposed wedding venue on Honeyville Road. In the packet, are two pictures which outline the available venue parking spaces. At the barn, there is room for four rows that can hold 92 cars, including six spaces for disabled parking access. The other parcel has room for six rows that can accommodate 102 cars. That is a total of 200 parking spaces. She also addressed the concerns stemming from light reflection from trees and dust. She explained that included in the packet are satellite images of eight county venues that have field parking. In terms of light reflection from trees, the western side of the barn has a natural mature tree buffer. The southern border of the barn has a variety of hardwood citrus, evergreens, and flowering ornamentals. The east side of the barn, which is closest to the neighboring residences, has green giant arborvitaes. Danielle explained that the green giant arborvitaes are great for screening and windbreaks as they quickly reach 25 to 30 feet tall and 10 feet wide. In 10 years, they can reach 50 to 60 feet tall and 20 feet wide. The trees will help assuage both glare and reflection as well as any dust, acting as natural air filters.

Daphne Dinges spoke regarding the SUP for Jeff Dinges and presented a letter and a petition in support of the proposed wedding venue to the Board. She emphasized that the opposition to the venue is solely based on personal matters. She also noted that all county requirements have been fulfilled for the SUP.

Jeff Dinges stressed that the resistance is personal and that if the application for the Special Use Permit (SUP) was submitted in another name, there would not be any opposition. He discussed several businesses operating out of the neighboring properties and the amount of traffic generated by those businesses.

Supervisor Vaughan asked Jeff Dinges what it would take for peace and harmony in that community. Mr. Vaughan explained that part of the responsibility of the Board of Supervisors is to make decisions on behalf of the citizens to promote peace and harmony within Page County. Mr. Vaughan shared that the Supervisors try to make the best logical decision by looking at the location and the impact, but controversy makes the process harder. Supervisor Foltz asked about the height of the fence and if the new entrance had been approved. Mr. and Mrs. Dinges said the fence is planned to be six feet, but they could make it as high as needed, and the new entrance is completely approved. Mrs. Dinges noted that all county requirements have been fulfilled and asked the Board to focus on that and not on family strife. Supervisor Vaughan explained that the Board has to think about the long-term impact of any decisions. Supervisor Stroupe noted that the SUP application stated that Maple Road would only be used for personal and utility use. All traffic for events would use the new entrance from Honeyville Road, and these stipulations were transferable with ownership. Supervisor Louderback asked if the barn had the same footprint as before the remodel. The Dinges' responded that,

yes, the footprint is the same. Mr. Louderback also asked about the impact of people near the operating chicken house. Supervisor Guzy echoed his concern about the proximity of people to the chicken house. Mr. Dinges explained that the plan had changed from the original SUP application, and neither the entrance nor the parking spaces are located close to the chicken house.

Administrator’s Report:

Mrs. Amity Moler, County Administrator, had nothing further to report since the Board had already discussed the historical markers.

Supervisors Time:
